After that he taught Spanish at Rocky Mountain Lutheran High School for six years. Now he, along with his beautiful wife of

2 Corinthians 5:14-15

When reading this passage, we often concentrate on how Christ has died for all out of love—and understandably so. What we often read, but neglect to take to heart is the second part, "we no longer live for ourselves, but for him." At Great Plains we are blessed with the opportunity to teach this truth, but it goes far beyond this. We get to live it. How better to live for him than to convince the next generation of this truth—we live for him.

In my role as Learning Resource Coordinator, this is exactly what I am privileged to do every day at GPL. I work individually, in small groups, and in classrooms support-

ing teachers and students alike to help them see that God made them for a purpose. He created them with their own unique abilities and talents to live lives of service to him. Often students who are uniquely challenged with school

up in their failures and forget their God given purpose or even doubt they can serve this purpose. In the past, some families felt their needs were too great for our school to support without additional help, causing us and them to lose the chance to be strengthened in these truths every day.

My role is to listen, teach, guide, support and pray for these students to succeed in our school so they can continue to see how God has crafted them and created them with intention and purpose. Their challenges are not a burden or weakness, but rather precisely how God created them, and I strive to encourage and support them through these challenges so they can be successful in high school and beyond. I will help them capitalize on their strengths, as well as learn strategies for their areas of struggle, all with the end goal of preparing them to live for Christ in whatever path God has planned for them.

Since the beginning of the school year, I have been blessed to serve many students in multiple capacities within

For those eligible,
I collaborated and
created accommodation plans
for 10 students
as well as facilitated the referral
process for two

students leading to correct identification of special education eligibility. During the school day, I observe in various classrooms to identify ways students can be more fully supported, I run three Guided Study Halls in which students are taught study skills and homework completion strategies, I teach one math intervention period, as well

as one period of social skills intervention. Along with planned student support and classes, on a daily basis 10-15 students utilize the Learning Resource Center for help on homework, writing skills, test anxiety, study skills, reading and math support, or simply to work through challenges they encounter as high schoolers.

Along with directly working with students, I collect and monitor student data to ensure students are not falling through the cracks and are given support proactively, rather than reactively whenever possible. I provide

small professional development to teachers of instructional strategies to better support struggling learners. I also collaborate with staff on instructional strategies and resources for maximizing student success socially, behavioraly, and academically.

Our goal at Great Plains is simple and right there in our mission: we are focused on preparing students for lives of service to their communities and their Lord. Adding this new position allows for us to ensure this mission is achieved for ALL of our students, preparing them re-

gardless of their abilities or talents- for all are able to live lives for Christ. I thank you for the opportunity to serve GPL and God's Kingdom in this capacity. Praise be to our Father in heaven!

Now a little bit about me. I grew up in northwest Arkansas, went to Nebraska Lutheran High School and then on to Martin Luther College to get my bachelors degree in Elementary Education. After graduating in 2013, I declined to take a call to instead pursue my Master's in Special Education from the University of Kansas. I worked as a graduate research assistant in the Department of Special Education, and after completing my degree, I spent two and half years serving as a project coordinator working to build sustainable, proactive school systems to prevent school failure and support school success. I had the pleasure to conduct research and coordinate efforts across states in early prevention for students at risk using behavioral screening instruments, and implementation of evidence-based behavior interventions and classroom management practices.

In 2017, I received a call to teach grades 2-4 at Mt. Olive Lutheran School in Overland Park, KS. It was my joy and privilege to serve at the school until I received a call to serve at GPL this



past spring. I feel blessed to be in this position to support students and look forward to seeing how God will work through me for the good of his Kingdom.

My husband Casey and I have been married for 8 years. He works at Big Stone Therapies as a Physical Therapy Assistant. We have two daughters, Marlow (5), and Ida (2), who keep us busy and laughing, and one rescue pup, Luna. We love getting together with people and finding things to do with the kids around town. I love the outdoors, reading, being with the kids, and trying new foods!

I am really looking forward to getting to know all the students and families! We are so excited to be part of this awesome community!

By the Numbers

Our current enrollment is 137.

We have students from 6 countries: China (1), Democratic Republic of the Congo (2), Ethiopia (1), South Africa (1), South Korea (1), and the USA (131).

We have students from 7 states: Alabama (3), Florida (1), Hawaii (1), Minnesota (26), North Dakota (2), South Dakota (97), and Wisconsin (1).

There are 74 girls and 63 boys.

There are 62 dorm students and 75 commuting students.

We have 41 freshmen, 29 sophomores, 40 juniors, and 27 seniors.

107 students (78%) are W/ELS, 8 (6%) are members of other Lutheran denominations, 15 (11%) are members of other Christian churches, and 9 (6%) are kingdom prospects.

Over 90% of students are involved in one or more cocurricular activity.
